April was autism acceptance month! In 1970, the Autism Society launched a nationwide effort to encourage autism awareness. The purpose of this campaign was to ensure that all individuals affected by autism are able to achieve the

highest quality life possible. Since then, the prevalence of autism in society has increased from 1 in 125 children to 1 in 54 children. This increase has led to the change from "Autism Awareness" to "Autism Acceptance," to foster
